History

In 1871, Charles Trumbull Hayden founded Tempe, establishing its early infrastructure with a store, flour mill, warehouses, blacksmith shops, and a ferry. Today, Tempe stands on the historic and ancestral lands of Native peoples, including the O'Odham (Pima), Piipaash (Maricopa), and their ancestors, the area's original inhabitants. We also acknowledge the enduring connection of the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community and the Gila River Indian Community to this land.
